In the days, weeks, and months that follow extreme weather events, the public will be looking for information on how to properly get rid of huge amounts of dead trees, limbs, leaves, and brush. In the core of damaged areas, there is often a municipal curbside pickup system in place- so that isn't necessarily where you'll need to focus your public outreach and education energy. Instead, the neighboring areas are the real trouble spots- places where wind and rain dropped limbs and toppled a few unhealthy trees, but no formal storm cleanup was initiated by the town or county.
