### Safe Disposal of Woody Storm Debris

Fallen trees are among the many hazards and challenges that hurricane season brings. In the wake of these major storms, it is extremely important for folks to know that moving woody debris over long distances can inadvertently spread tree-killing insects to new places. In places with known infestations or quarantines, giving clear directions for safe disposal is crucial. A recent Alert from our friends at USDA APHIS and Clemson University's Department of Plant Industry regarding the South Carolina Asian Longhorned Beetle Eradication Program in light of Storm Idalia is a perfect example of the timely education and outreach that's needed after events like these.

## Elm Zigzag Sawfly Popping Up in Multiple Eastern States

Elm zigzag sawfly made its debut in North American in Quebec in 2020 with subsequent detection in VA (2021), and NC, MD, PA, NY in 2022. Unfortunately, we can now add Vermont and Massachusetts to the list. This species matures in small cocoons attached to leaves or nearby objects- which definitely could include standing dead trees or cut firewood. It reproduces parthenogenically so just one sawfly is enough to start a whole new infestation.
