Emerald Ash Borer (EAB)

- First found in the United States in 2002
- First found in Akwesasne in 2016
- Causes ash tree mortality during the larval stage

- Response options
 - Monitoring & Surveillance
 - Ash Importation
 - Forest Management

 - Seed saving






