Get Ready for Arbor Day 2025!

On April 25, millions of Americans will observe Arbor Day by planting new trees! While planting trees is important to the well-being of our forests, it is just as critical to learn how to protect both new and older trees from damage by invasive insects and diseases. The death of large, mature trees due to these pests can be devastating to neighborhoods, parks, and natural areas.

Arbor Day Tree Protection Tips to Share:

• Buy your trees and plants from a reputable source, and purchase certified, pest-free nursery stock whenever possible.

• Burn firewood and other woody debris near where it was sourced – that means the wood was cut in a nearby forest, in the same county, or preferably within 10 miles from where you'll have your fire. Take care to respect state and local regulations on the movement of firewood and other unprocessed wood - this information can be found in our Firewood Map!

• If you have been camping or hiking in a forested area, clean your equipment, boots, animals, and gear before returning home so not to spread unwanted forest pests or invasive plant seeds.

• Be on the lookout for invasive pests, and if you notice an insect or tree disease you don't recognize, take a photo or obtain a specimen of it, and contact your state
