Take Action NOW to Stop Asian Longhorned Beetle

If you only ask the public to check their trees once a year, then the best time of year to do it is in August. This is when the large adult Asian longhorned beetles are most commonly seen, as well as when see the damage they cause is quite obvious. The best line of defense against the insect is people who take the time to check their trees for the beetle and signs of damage. Your organization should be spreading the word on:

- Conducting an annual tree check in August
- Reporting beetles or signs of beetle damage
- Purchasing firewood where it will be burned

Boy Scouts of America approves invasive species template for all scout camps nationwide

The BSA National Conservation and Environment Task Force just completed a template that has been made available on the <u>BSA website</u> (scroll to very bottom) to guide camp staff on how to deal with invasive species in Boy Scout camps nationwide. The template is a starting point for camp-specific plans for invasive species prevention, early detection, and control activities- including how to best discourage scouts from moving firewood. The template emphasizes cooperative action, stating that firewood is not to be brought into scout camps from the outside, and any firewood that does enter a scout camp should be promptly burned.
